At the heart of Greater Peoria is a thriving healthcare industry, anchored by established institutions and supported by innovative startups and research.

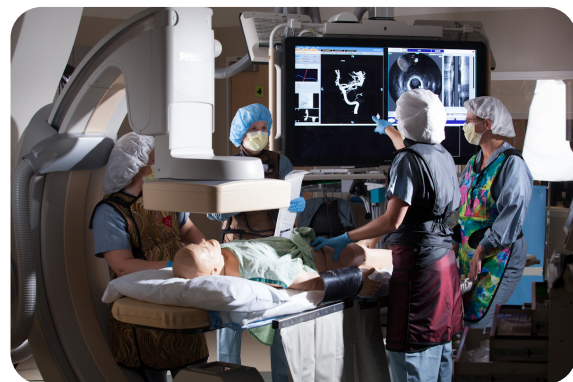
OSF HealthCare Saint Francis Medical Center is the state's fourth largest medical center and the area's only Level I Trauma Center. It is home to OSF HealthCare Cardiovascular Institute, the Illinois Neurological Institute and Children's Hospital of Illinois.



UnityPoint Health provides comprehensive, coordinated care to patients throughout central Illinois through physician clinics, hospitals and home care services. UnityPoint is home to the Center for Senior Behavioral Health, Illinois Institute for Addiction Recovery, Women's Diagnostic Center and the Wellmobile, which offers free mobile health screenings.



The University of Illinois College of Medicine Peoria (UICOMP) partners with OSF and UnityPoint to educate physicians and biomedical scientists, advancing knowledge and providing healthcare in a setting of education and research. Area hospitals act as teaching sites for medical students in residency programs.

Jump Simulation, a collaboration between UICOMP and OSF HealthCare, is a state-of-the-art medical training organization, research hub, and international leader in simulation and innovation. Jump Sim replicates all areas of patient care using real medical equipment and the latest in simulation technology for performance improvement and model development.
